What We Do

Each of the six color blocks of the First Steps logo represents a core area of service, outlining our comprehensive strategy to prepare children for long-term school success.

With measurable outcomes across each of its six school readiness strategy areas, First Steps is getting results.



Healthy Start

We begin with a focus on providing a healthy start to life. This includes prenatal and post-partum services for both mother and baby. In 2007, First Steps collaborated with key philanthropic and agency partners to bring Nurse-Family Partnership to SC having a significant impact on reducing premature births and Medicaid costs.



Quality Childcare

Quality childcare starts with quality childcare providers. Our quality enhancement and training strategies lead to improved teacher-student interaction, which research shows has a significant impact on a child's development and success in school.



Family Strengthening

Our home visitation strategies, such as Parents as Teachers, Parent-Child Home and Early Steps to School Success, are helping parents understand their responsibilities to care for and be positive models for their children. As a result of First Steps' intervention and parenting support, 66% of clients initially assessed at "low" levels of parenting have achieved moderate or high levels of parenting skill.



Early Education

Private-public partnerships through First Steps 4K have led to significant cost efficiencies in the delivery of publicly funded 4K. One recent analysis suggests First Steps is achieving comparable results, without the need for costly capital construction, for 80 cents on the dollar. Early Head Start expands quality early learning and family support to infants and toddlers.



Early Intervention

Children's school readiness depends on their healthy growth and development. First Steps helps identify potential delays early through developmental screenings and referring children to BabyNet and other early intervention resources.



School Transition

Each of the corresponding blocks of services leads ultimately to the goal of transitioning children successfully to school. Programs like Countdown to Kindergarten are ultimately preparing children for school success.

Parents as Teachers



Parents play a critical role in their child's development.

Program Description

Parents as Teachers (PAT) is an evidence-based home visiting program designed to build strong communities, thriving families and children who are healthy, safe and ready to succeed. PAT services include:

- 1. Personal Visits at least twice monthly
- 2. Monthly Group Connections with other PAT families
- 3. Screenings and Assessments to identify developmental concerns
- 4. Connections to Outside Resources that families may need to succeed

Berkeley County First Steps serves families in greatest need. Among our PAT families:

92% ... live in poverty

74% ... single parents

17% ... less than high school diploma

Meet William!



William turned three in November 2016 and was referred to Berkeley County School District Child Find for evaluation and placement. Mom was very hesitant to have William evaluated and was fearful that he was being labeled because Dad is confined to a wheelchair. After receiving reassurance from her Parent Educator, Mom agreed to the evaluation. It was determined that William qualified for the ½ day preschool IDEA Part B. William and his mother continued with the Parents As Teachers program and within weeks a visible transformation could be seen. William walked into the room eager to learn, was talking and having conversations with his Parent Educator and trying new activities. Mom was proud of the new skills he was learning and would bring items that he had worked on at home in to show the PE. The family had been in the program since William was an infant.

This year, our Parents as Teachers program:

- ✓ Averaged 2.0 home visits per family
- ✓ Identified and addressed 30 potential developmental delays, and made 213 connections for families to services such as Adult Ed, BabyNet, Early Literacy, Medical Home, Quality Childcare.
- ✓ Improved parenting practices in interaction by 61% and literacy skills by 49%.
- Provided 838 books to families.
- ✓ Facilitated six Early Literacy Workshops to three different struggling rural schools.

Child Care Training

Those who care for young children need high-quality, accessible, and affordable professional development.

Program Description

High-quality child care hinges on high-quality professional development that meets the needs of the local child care workforce.

First Steps-sponsored training is certified through the SC Center for Child Care Career Development and includes topics in the areas of nutrition, health and safety, curriculum, child guidance, professional development and program administration. Best practices in training include not only the training itself, but follow-up in the classroom.

Child Care Scholarships

Too many families in Berkeley County cannot afford quality care for their children.

Program Description

Access to quality child care is essential for children while away from their primary caregivers. Yet, of those families income-eligible for child care assistance in South Carolina, only a small fraction receive it due to lack of funds. In the absence of nurturing and consistently available family, friends or neighbors, parents are faced with few - or no – affordable care options.

Berkeley First Steps serves families in greatest need. Among our scholarship families:

100% ... live in poverty

64% ... are single parent households

57% ...have experienced depression, mental illness, or substance abuse

28% ... had children with potential developmental delays

In addition to regular monitoring of child care providers that receive First Steps scholarships, First Steps conducts at least one developmental screening each year with scholarship children and connects families to needed services within the community.

Berkeley County First Steps integrates scholarships with home visitation programs such as, Parents As Teachers, and Nurse Family Partnership to ensure families are receiving ongoing support and advocacy.

This year, our Scholarship program:

- **✓** Provided 14 children with scholarship assistance so their parents could work or attend school
- ✓ Identified and addressed 38 risk factors among scholarship families
- ✓ Made 45 connections for families to services such as BabyNet, Head Start, BCSD, DSS, and local charities
- Supported 8 small businesses in Berkeley County by subsidizing child care tuition for families who would not otherwise be able to afford quality care



Community Impact

Parent Educators Change Lives In Berkeley County

Renee Gant-Parent Educator Impacting Generations



I was on the Berkeley County First Steps Board that established the first program in the county. As a part of my desire to become directly involved with providing services, I quit my position to become a First Steps Parent Educator in 2001. As a parent educator I partner with parents of children from birth to age five to model and teach parents strategies for teaching their children various skills, e.g., language, cognitive, fine and gross motor, and social-emotional skills. The primary program objective is to increase children's school readiness and success both academically and social-emotionally. In the beginning, the focus of First Steps was the child but over the years the focus shifted to the whole family, including parents, other adults and children in the family in order to support and strengthen the entire family. Parents have the potential to be great teachers because they want the very best for their children and only need assistance in providing an optimal learning environment. Likewise, children are like little sponges soaking up the learning presented to them. Therefore, I am inspired everyday by the willingness of the parents and the eagerness of the children

to accept the lessons and experiences I provide. They are a joy with which to work. I am especially excited to see parents who become involved in their young preschooler's education, e.g., attending Group Connections meetings and using other community resources such as the local library. Often I have an ex-client's child's teacher remark that the child is "so smart" or "so bright" or "so well-prepared." These remarks tell me the First Steps Program achieved its goal of increasing children's school readiness, especially reading readiness.

Nadine Todd-Career Educator Putting Children and Families First



I began working as a parent educator with the Berkeley County First Steps Parents As Teachers Program in October of 2001. I'm beginning my 17th year as a parent educator. Prior to this I was very active on the State Interagency Coordinating Council with BabyNet. I was always concerned about the children who did not qualify for the BabyNet program but who were lagging behind in their development. The First Steps program was the perfect fit for me. I love being able to encourage parents during the screening process and helping them to find additional services when the needs arise. Having been a parent whose child received occupational, physical and speech therapy as an infant, I am able to understand the emotional impact that a referral to these services

may have on a parent of a young child. Supporting a parent through this process and watching the child become successful in these skills has been one of the most rewarding ways that I know I have made a difference. The children in some of the first families that were enrolled in the program are now seniors in High School. I have been able to watch them excel in sports, academics, orchestra and the arts to name a few. Parents will still send me a text to let me know of accomplishments that these kids have made. There comes a time after doing several visits that the children are more interested in the books that I bring than they are in the toys. I absolutely love when I get to witness the children "reading" Brown Bear all by themselves for the first time. Another favorite is when the children sit down and want to sing their favorite songs with me. Even babies who are not yet speaking can communicate when they want to sing Row Row Row your boat or Twinkle Twinkle little star. ALL of my parents want to be their child's First and Best Teacher. My goal is to help them accomplish that!
